CEL Course Audit

This fall we are conducting an audit of all courses tagged with the <u>CEL Attribute</u>. Please take a look at our <u>master list of CEL courses</u> and <u>let us know</u> if your course is missing or if your course no longer should be tagged. Courses with the CEL attribute means that the course contains the following components:

- Learning Outcomes: The community engagement activity is tied to one or more course learning outcomes.
- **Application and Integration:** Guided by their instructor and working with a community partner, students engage with a community issue (local, regional or global), integrating theory and practice.
- Reciprocity: The community experience seeks to offer value to the community partner as well as to the students.
- **Reflection and assessment:** Students intentionally participate in reflection on the community experience (ethical and civic dimensions), the discipline and themselves.



Changemaking at Drake

Campus interest in innovation, entrepreneurship and changemaking has been building for several years. In May 2020 Renee Sedlacek Lee, Director of Community Engaged Learning, Neil

Ward, Associate Professor of Graphic Design, and Bill Adamowski, Executive Director of Innovation, Entrepreneurship, and Human-Centered Design, were appointed co-chairs of the newly forming Changemaker Implementation Team.

The Vision is to create a university-wide culture that equips students with the skillsets, knowledge, and motivation to critically identify societal and organizational challenges and develop innovative and sustainable solutions that serve a rapidly changing world.

At Drake, a focus on Changemaking shifts attention, energy and resources from simply responding to community "needs" to developing solutions that change the systems (root causes) that create inequities and injustice.

This comes by understanding ones constructed reality, values, biases, and identity

and using those lenses to work with the community. Drake Changemakers will have a bias towards action and recognize the historical and social context of the problems a community is facing, the policies and power structures impacting the problems, and collaborate with the people and groups already working towards solutions.

Sprout Garden is Moving!

Sprout garden will be relocating this fall from it's Forest Ave location to make room for the DMPS Community Stadium project. The garden is tentatively planned to be located in the grassy area west of campus on 31st Street, just south of Drake West Village. The new space will allow us to expand
