- 1. Report from the Dean
  - a. College announcements:
    - i. Associate Deans-jobs were split-starting July 1
      - 1. Maria Bohorquez-Strategic Initiatives
      - 2. Natalie Bayer-Student Affairs
    - ii. Dean-Elect Gesine Gerhard will be here first week of May
    - iii. Tomorrow-Microsoft OneDrive on their computers
    - iv. P&T procedures-Cabinet/Council at the next two meetings for one more discussion
    - v. A&S Convocation on Thursday at 6:30pm
- 2. Old Business: Human Rights Studies Program proposal, visit from Deb DeLaet (approved by Cabinet; see folder of attachments)
  - a. Was tabled. DeLaet is here to discuss, questions were forwarded onto her.
  - b. More collaborated than taking resources from other departments
  - c. Not a new separate department. Credited in their own departments; space in their schedules. More robust enrollments
    - i. SCS mostly. Department had strong support, think that it could help with their department. Help with enrollments in that department.
    - ii. Develop with summer workshops-assessment measures
      - 1. Evaluation will take place within their own departments
  - d. Poaching, taking enrollment from other groups
    - i. IR, LPS, SCS
      - 1. Faculty support the program and aren't worried
      - 2. Recruiting tool for their own programs instead
    - ii. Amnesty International programs in high schools are robust, could pull from this
    - iii. Fulbright Fellow-have a link with this department
    - iv. LPS –used it as a recruiting tool for their candidates
    - v. Interdisciplinary programs recently added had net enrollments that were up, other majors went down.
  - e. Not competing against each other, competing against other colleges
  - f. Questions:
    - i. Course reassignment: Need 2 for the first year. A lot of recruitment, not helping with evaluations.
      - 1. Course offered: main course-can be offered twice a year
      - 2. Lourdes-teaching a different course rather than a lower enrolled course. Comparative Transnational
      - 3. Three faculty available to be teaching at each time. Once a year for the core courses

- 4. Storytelling course, capstone course, comparative transnational, 1 or 2 more courses
- 5. Reallocate existing resources-are there people who do have free times. SCS does have space. CS may not be able to fulfill commitments, have other options.
- 6. Funding is external instead of internal. Money has to come from somewhere.
