Admissions and Enrollment Corner

The summer months brought with them a transition between admissions and orientation with prospective students becoming current Drake students. In A&S, we welcomed 427 students and families to Drake (366 EFR students, 61 transfer students) with a primary or secondary major in A&S – and began the important work of helping students settle into their academic disciplines and meet faculty mentors, along with opening up opportunities for campus involvement and holistic care/support. It was remarkable to see our campus community come together for this all-important handoff that spans more than just a shift from Slate to Banner. Instead, it is symbolic as we fold new members of our campus into the student body and into the College of Arts and Sciences. It was with trust, anticipation, and excitement that these first-year and transfer students made their debut on campus; we now welcome them into classes, our offices, studios, and labs throughout this first week to build on those impressions. The ongoing work of recruitment shifts to retention – and thank you in advance for being the friendly face that helps our students find their way this semester. We look toward the 10th day census, which will be a culminating moment for the 2024-25 admissions cycle (please remember those course validations!).


Des Moines Art Center: Light Within Ourselves






