## **Admissions & Enrollment Corner**

It is December! We are through with the series of **Fall Admissions events**. November 8th was the final Preview Day for 2024. A total of 75 students attended: 45 High School Seniors (fall 2025), 1 Transfer (Fall 2025), 3 transfers (Spring 2025), 24 High School Juniors (2026) and 2 High School Sophomores (2027). Of the HS Seniors, 29 are admitted, and four of those have submitted a tuition deposit.

It is now the season for **Virtual Spotlights**. There will be 9 Spotlights total for Drake, 4 of which feature A&S programs: Natural Sciences; Tech, Math, Data, and Computer Science; Humanities and Social Sciences; and Pathways to Pre-Law (A&S and other schools). these out, even if they have already been to campus. These Spotlights include faculty and students talking about Drake experiences, as well as Q&A sessions.

The College has engaged in **other segmented Admissions activities** - see, for example, the Political Science event under Celebrating A&S Highlights. In addition, Music held two "Music Major for a Day" sessions; Theatre has held an Audition Day; and Drake alum/high school math teacher Ellie Soosloff (Math/Math Ed majors with Spanish minor) brought 65+ Creston High School students to campus for exposure to Drake's Math and Computer Science Department. I encourage Departments to consider other local outreach and smaller scale Admissions events.

**Innovation! Music** is piloting new software to enhance their Admission process. If it works, we might look into similar systems to reach out to students more quickly with program-specific information.

**THANK YOU** to all the faculty and staff for their time and dedication to running all admission events this fall. Students come to Drake because of their interactions with you, faculty, so thank you! It makes a difference. In reading the comments from parents and students, their conversations with faculty and students are what they praise the most. Almost all leave campus feeling more excited about Drake than before they arrived.

We have some **spring events** coming up, and we still need some support! If you're interested in answering questions at an Academic Fair, showcasing student work at a program Overview, or have any ideas for unique recruitment events, please let us know!



# **Advising & Student Support Corner**

As the end of the semester approaches, please provide your students with an opportunity to complete **student evaluations**. According to the A&S Handbook, "the College of Arts and Sciences affirms the importance of student course evaluations to both the development of teaching excellence and of evaluation of faculty performance in relation to tenure, promotion and merit reviews." It mandates that "all faculty must provide for student evaluation of each course taught" (section 4.7 of the Handbook - Fac Handbook rev February2023.pdf (drake.edu).

**Final grades are due before 10:00 am** on Wednesday, Dec 18. University offices will be closed beginning at 4:30 p.m. on Friday, Dec 20 and will reopen on Thursday, Jan 2. It is extremely important to submit final grades by the deadline because academic standards (probation/suspension), graduation, transcripts, and scholarship awards are all dependent upon the timely submission of grades. Grades submitted late may affect a student's academic standing, progress towards graduation, pre-requisites checks, eligibility for financial aid, or, importantly, ability to graduate.

Submit grades for **everyone** on your roster(s). If a student appearing on your roster did not validate their attendance at the beginning of the semester, or stopped attending, please email <a href="mailto:marybeth.holtey@drake.edu">marybeth.holtey@drake.edu</a>, so follow-up can be completed. If a student has a non-reported grade on their transcript they cannot be listed on the Dean's List or President's List or earn a degree, as applicable.

If you enter a **grade incorrectly**, i.e. you enter a grade of B, but the student earned an A, please complete the following steps: MyDrake > Self Service > Course Grading Card > Grade Changes

If you are considering issuing an **incomplete** to a student who has disappeared in the last part of the semester, hasn't submitted substantial portions of work, and is not responsive to your outreach, please note that while it may seem friendly to extend an incomplete, in many cases experience (and data) has shown that these students rarely successfully complete the work or earn a high grade. Furthermore, the presence of several incompletes gives the student a false sense of hope. Students who take several incompletes may be in a type of financial aid "limbo," without resolved credits and a clear sense of hours earned. **And, new this** 

year, students who obtained books using Course Ready will need to return these books. If the successful resolution of an incomplete requires access to course text(s), please keep this in mind, when issuing an incomplete.

The grade of "IP" (in-progress) is appropriate only in the case of internships, practicums, or courses that do not fit the standard academic calendar.

If in a previous term you issued an incomplete (I) or in-progress grade (IP) and the student has now earned a letter grade, please enter that grade:

MyDrake > Self Service > Course Grading Card > I/IP/NR Grade Updates.

If you wish to extend the time by which a student has to complete the work in a class currently marked as incomplete or in-progress, please email <a href="marybeth.holtey@drake.edu">marybeth.holtey@drake.edu</a> so she can work with the Registrar's Office to create the extension.

If you oversaw an **independent study or internship**, please remember to enter a grade.



# **Celebrating A&S Highlights**




Congratulations to David E. Maxwell Distinguished Professor of International Affairs **Deb DeLaet**, who recently published "Female Genital Cutting Across Borders: Cultural Biases in the Contestation of Global Human Rights" in the journal, *Identities: Global Studies in Culture and Power.* While much of the focus on female genital mutilation (FGM) has been constructed as a set of non-Western practices, Professor DeLaet's article examines global norms condemning FGM and anti-FGM laws in Western countries as sites of power and contestation of fundamental human rights, including female genital cosmetic surgeries, male circumcision, and genital 'normalization' surgeries performed on intersex children. Professor of English **Carol Spaulding-Kruse** recently celebrated the launch of her new book, *Helen Button*, at Beaverdale Books, where she read from her Eludia prize winning novel, followed by a conversation with professor and award-winning author, Kali White VanBaale.

In this dual timeline narrative, a young French housekeeper lives out the years of World War II near Vichy France with her famous employers, Gertrude Stein and Alice Toklas. Decades later, she returns to France from the United States, finding that a fateful decision she made as a young woman echoes in the present in unexpected ways. You can find out more <u>here</u>. Assistant Professor of Art **Sascha Crasnow**'s new book, co-edited with Anne Marie E. Butler, has been published by Intellect Books. *Queer Contemporary Art of Southwest Asia North Africa presents new perspectives on queer visual culture in the Southwest Asia North Africa region from artists and scholars. The Department of Women's and Gender Studies, Professor **Deb Symonds**, and Dr. **Brett Russler** from the Department of History, and the Slay fund sponsored a lecture from Women's History Professor Bonnie Morris, "Title IX & Women's Sports History" which looked at the way in which 1970's female athletes like Billie Jean King influenced President Nixon's signing of the Education Amendments of 1972, now known as Title IX, which bans discrimination on the basis of sex in any program or activity at all federally-funded educational institutions.

The talk drew students and faculty from WGS and History during Bonnie's visit. It was an exceptional talk, held on the day of the Drake/lowa Women's Basketball Game which Bonnie also attended!



In collaboration with Drake alum and Assistant Professor of Educational Leadership, Dr. Amber Graeber, the Department of Political Science welcomed a group of AP Government students from Roosevelt High School on October 30. During their half-day on campus, they visited Dr. **Kieran Williams**'s Supreme Courts and Elections class and Dr. **Rachel Paine Caufield**'s FYS, "What to Expect When You're Electing: Election 2024." They also had a campus tour with the admissions office and lunch at Hubbell, which they loved!

Professor of Art History **Maura Lyon'**s exhibit *Acts of Projection* runs through January 17, 2025 at the Anderson Art Gallery. Click here for more details on the gallery's <u>Winter Hours</u>.

Acts of Projection: Magic Lantern Shows and the U.S. Civil War encompasses both the material artifacts of lantern shows – hand-painted slides and period projectors – as well as actual projections to simulate the original viewing experience. The exhibit examines two interrelated definitions of the term projection: using light to cast designs on a surface and the psychological concept of externalizing internal anxiety. It includes a site-specific work by the artist Johnny DiBlasi in order to demonstrate the continuing relevance of the projection format.
