A Note from the Dean

Dear Colleagues,

Sing! was the title of Sunday's concert by Drake University Choirs celebrating peace, joy, and diversity through music and word. The performance was a wonderful reminder to take a moment and appreciate the community we are a part of. A huge congratulations to the choirs under the direction of Professor Eric Barnum! We are thrilled to announce some other milestone events and achievements in the College of Arts and Sciences.

Stewardship updates:

We are getting close to documenting a significant estate gift for Biology that will fund several scholarships for students in Biology. The gift will be a game changer to recruit students for our strong natural science programs! The donor is also a passionate supporter of the arts and plans to give an additional smaller cash gift to our theatre department.

We just received a check for the \$1,000,000 gift for the Darling Institute under Keith Summerville's leadership. The endowment will provide scholarships for students ("Darling Scholars"), establish fellowships for faculty research, and create a Development Fund for Rural America.

The first proceeds from the Cliff Rea estate gift have been recorded (this is a \$4 million endowment for Biology). This tremendous investment will allow us to select the first endowed chair in Biology, support faculty research and student experiential learning, and to invest in equipment and facilities to boost our program.

All-In was a great success! We raised \$27,810 for the College of Arts and Sciences and the Friends of Drake Arts during the 24-hour giving challenge. The campaign also brought lots of traffic to our social media sites. We are grateful for the generous gifts!

There is more good news to share: our recruitment efforts are paying off! Please check out the numbers below. It takes a village (aka a college) to recruit students, and Arts and Sciences faculty and staff have stepped up with great success. Thank you for your dedication and amazing work! We are well on our way to reach our target of 330 students in the Arts and Sciences and 650 students for Drake overall. I am confident that we can make this happen together!

We have three exciting milestone events coming up in the College. Please save the dates for our first Art and Sciences Alumni Career Panel and Networking Event on March 27, our annual Conference on Undergraduate Research (DUCURS) on April 10, and the Oscars of the Arts & Sciences—our Honors Convocation on April 17. You can find more detailed information and action steps below. We are also looking forward to some amazing music and theatre productions over the next few weeks. Make sure you reserve your tickets for Drake Theatre's performance of *Legally Blonde* (April 3-6), it promises to be a great show!

I wish I could list more accomplishments here as this is only a fraction of what you all do and bring to the Arts and Sciences! Please know that each of you are deeply appreciated as you make the College a very special place for our students. I could not be prouder to represent the College of Arts and Sciences in these unprecedented times!

As we experience policy changes at the state and federal level, I ask you to reach out to your students and let them know that they are not only welcome at Drake, but that they *belong* here. Recently passed legislation has targeted the transgender community, and achievements that promote diversity and inclusion on college campuses have been called into question. The diversity of our Drake community, the different backgrounds, perspectives, and languages that each individual brings are fundamental to our mission to prepare students for productive careers, active leadership, and responsible global citizenship. These are the core values we have been teaching in our classes, and we will continue to do so.



Admissions & Enrollment Corner

ADMISSIONS UPDATE

We are in the Admissions season that focuses on increasing tuition deposits and converting admitted students into excited Bulldogs! Remember there is a trend that students and families tend to visit Drake once rather than numerous times. Each encounter with faculty matters! What are our upcoming efforts with admitted students?

- Admitted Students Days will be March 7, March 28, April 4, and April 11. These on-campus events feature hour-long academic meetings related to individual programs. The goal: to help admitted students envision what it would be like to be in that program and to share what makes each Drake major distinctive from similar programs elsewhere. There also are mock classes for admitted students to attend as well as a full schedule of information sessions, tours, a general information fair, lunch, and more.
- NEW THIS YEAR: We will hold a series of faculty-led, program-specific virtual meetings for admitted students, in which students can ask questions and compare particular features of a Drake major (or series of majors) with its counterparts at other institutions. Let Associate Dean Lisa West know if you would like to participate in these.

Recent Successes:

- January and February one-on-one faculty visits are on par or higher than recent years.
- Program-specific Admissions events University-wide have seen an increase of 36.4% over the past year. For Arts & Sciences, both Music and Theatre Audition participation was up.
- 50 students and their families attended the two **local Admitted Student Parties** in February despite exciting weather events. Local alumni, faculty, and staff were present to talk everything Drake for these highenergy events.
- There are other February and March Admitted Student Parties with alumni volunteers and Drake personnel
 in cities from Dallas to Milwaukee. Like the local ones, these allow admitted students to meet other potential
 Bulldogs and hear from alums about their academic journeys.
- Compared to last year and two years ago at this time, tuition deposits for EFR are higher, both for the College
 and University (167 net TDs for EFR in A&S this year; 117 last year; 143 two years ago). In other words, we
 are up over 42% at this time compared to last year for new entering A&S students, and over 16% at this time
 compared to two years ago (our benchmark year). The next couple of months will be crucial to reach our target
 —let's continue the great work!

Even though there is a blizzard at the moment (of writing this), we need to anticipate "melt"! There will be ongoing efforts to remain in contact with tuition-deposited students throughout the summer, particularly the weeks following June Orientation.

And the next cycle starts. April 12 will see Sophomores and Juniors for a Preview Day (with an Academic Fair), and April 12 and 19 will be a "Last Peek" for Seniors and Transfers. This summer, Admissions is condensing summer programming into three extended "Bulldog Days of Summer" on June 6, August 8, and August 15. Invitations to participate will happen over the next month or so.

Thank you, as always, to faculty and staff who set up for these events, take time to speak with students and their families along each step of the process, prepare materials to handout, and help students answer the question, "why Drake?"

Notes from the Associate Dean for Student Support

Student Support

Please **reach out** to students who are struggling to process recent state, federal, and global events. Offer to share space with them or to listen to their concerns. There was a Town Hall Monday March 10 at 9 AM in Cowles Reading Room (with President Martin, Provost Mattison and Dean of Students Parker present) for students to discuss recent lowa House bills. We encourage follow-up conversations. Addressing the concerns student have is better than silence.

New Academic Standing Policy

Drake has implemented a **new Academic Standing Policy**, effective fall 2024. Students must have at least a 2.0 cumulative GPA and have passed at least 67% of cumulative credits attempted to be on good academic standing. Therefore - it may no longer be in a student's best interest to withdraw from a course mid-semester; while withdrawing can protect the GPA, it impacts the % completion rate negatively. Advising Task Force

The College Advising Task Force will meet early next week for a preliminary meeting - then the first week or two after spring break. If you would like to be on the Task Force or have input, please contact Associate Dean Lisa West. Our goal is to discuss what is going well with the Blended Advising Model and what we can improve. Key questions include the following. How will we know if academic advising is meeting College goals - and how can we gather data to assess it? How can we work on a College-level implementation of this University-level service?

Registration begins April 7. If you have not already met with your advisees to review progress toward their major/minor and suggested courses to take, please make those appointments now! Academic advisors will be working with students, but we want to ensure faculty input as desired.

Harkin Center Scholarship Opportunities

FERPA Reminders

Students are increasingly wishing to include their parents in academic advising conversations (and parents new to the college setting are used to receiving frequent updates about student progress in high school courses, without a consideration to privacy law). If you're faced with a remote appointment where a student is nodding off camera or you receive requests for parents to join in on a conversation, please direct the student to complete the **release of information form** at <u>Authorization for Release of Information rev071217.pdf</u>.

There are **best practices** for receiving the **Release of Information Form**:

- 1. The student should complete the form in-person, in front of faculty and/or staff.
- 2. If the form cannot be completed in-person, the completed and signed form should be sent from a Drake email to registrar@drake.edu. The Registrar's Office will then send the completed form to the AS Dean's Office.
- 3. Any revocation of the Release of Information Form should be submitted by the student, in writing, to registrar@drake.edu.

Please note that if a student enters the University before turning 18, enrollment in a post-secondary institution results in adherence to privacy law, i.e., a 17-year-old student is still protected by FERPA and information should not be shared with a parent/guardian without the student's consent.

Responding to Students of Concern

We hear that stress, burnout, health issues and fatigue, and pending and recent lowa bills are increasingly taking toll on students, affecting their attendance, response to outreach, and submission of work. If you are concerned about a student in your course, please **raise a flag in Starfish**. Depending on the type of the flag, students will either be able to see your comments or receive a follow-up from the appropriate office. Another option is to complete an **early alert form**. The form feeds directly to the Dean's office and facilitates our proactive outreach to students who need assistance and connections to key college and university resources.

Forecasting Midterm Grade Entry

Midterm grades are **due before 10 a.m. on Wed, Mar 26**. The entry of midterm grades helps students to make informed decisions on whether or not to remain in a spring course(s). If working with advisees enrolled in 12 credits, please note that dropping a course(s) with a W will not take a student to part-time standing. *But if working with a student athlete, international student or student receiving Veteran's Administration (V.A.) benefits, please urge the student to consult the appropriate office before seeking a drop with a W. Students have have through Sunday, Mar 30 to drop a course with a W, but should take action before Friday, Mar 28 if they want to speak to someone about their decision. Students will need to complete the add/drop form at www.drake.edu/registrar Forms > Add/Drop Form. Completed drop forms should be submitted to studentsupport.as@drake.edu.*



Faculty Development Corner

Course Ready textbook adoptions coming due for Summer & Fall 2025



We are now in the second semester of Course Ready – by comparison, there were 152 more students who opted in to Course Ready for the spring semester compared to the fall, suggesting that the program is gaining traction! We continue to learn how to best adapt this program at Drake (this spring, most help desk inquiries were about how to access digital bookshelf and when books would arrive).

If you are teaching a summer course, you are asked to submit your **FAST textbook submissions** (through Blackboard) by **Friday, March 14**.

For **fall courses**, the window to submit FAST textbook submissions (through Blackboard) is between **Monday**, **March 10 and Friday**, **April 18**.

Lessons Learned:

- (1) If you would typically list a text as "**recommended**" on your reading list, it must be listed as "**required**" in Course Ready, or it will not be included in the students' package.
- (2) Course Ready extends beyond traditional texts, and it can include **materials** (e.g., art/design supplies, software subscriptions needed for instruction).
- (3) Course Ready **prefers newer editions**; older ones may be difficult to obtain, even though they are less expensive for those who opt-out of the program.

As a reminder, the goals of the program are three-fold: a) helping ensure that students have materials on the first day of instruction, b) providing affordable options for students, and c) staying in compliance with the Higher Education Opportunity Act. 




