On my way to work yesterday, I had to stop several times to admire and take pictures of the gorgeous fall colors. Gotta love Iowa when it looks and feels like this! It almost made me forget that we are in the busiest stretch of the semester. Thank you for submitting mid-term grades, making extra time to meet with students as they register for the spring semester, and finding time to check in with your colleagues. Application deadlines for sabbatical, P&T, and Faculty Development Grants are happening right now, and admission events, student support celebrations, and All-College meetings are piling up. Thanksgiving break is just a few weeks away—we can make it!



I am elated by the many accomplishments and exciting developments happening in the Arts and Sciences. The Stalnaker lecture is always a highlight, and the Halloween “Hauntcert” put on by the Drake Symphony—in costumes—was equally delightful! Since my last newsletter note, I traveled to and from Qingdao, where four of our faculty are teaching 170 students in Biology and Data Analytics classes and labs. It was amazing to see how our colleagues have adjusted, bringing the Drake way of teaching and learning to China and converting Qingdao United College students into proud Bulldogs!

During our visit, David Skidmore and I got to observe classes and labs, met students and Chinese colleagues, and checked out living arrangements, campus facilities and local food. There were challenges, such as adjusting lab experiments, learning the Chinese LMS, and ensuring IT security. However, our faculty have been true trailblazers and pioneers. One year into this partnership, we can proudly say that the program is off to a fantastic start. In its second year, the program has not only facilitated global exchange but also generated considerable net revenue for Drake. We have begun searches to hire more faculty to teach in Qingdao, as we will need nine faculty to cover all courses next fall.

Our next College meeting is scheduled for Friday, November 14, where Council will share updates to the annual evaluation form. Please also save the date for our College Social on Sunday, December 7, at 2pm in the Knapp Center. We are doing something new and fun to get together at the end of the semester. I hope you can join us for this family friendly event!

Celebrating A&S Highlights

41st Annual Stalnaker Lecture

On October 16th, we hosted the College of Arts Sciences' prestigious Stalnaker Lecture, awarded to a distinguished faculty member who gives a lecture to the University community on a topic in their discipline.

Ellis and Nelle Levitt Distinguished Professor of Psychology **Maria Valdovinos** presented "How Did We Get Here? Undertreatment of, and Psychotropic Overprescription to, People with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities," drawing from her research as well as from her work in residential and day treatment settings with adults diagnosed with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Her lecture challenged some of the current treatment approaches for this population, calling for greater access to preventative supports and individualized evaluation and treatment.

Following a Question and Answer session, emcee Dr. Nanci Ross, Associate Professor of Biology and Vice-Chair of A&S Council presented the award for the 2026 Stalnaker Lecturer to Professor of Physics Dr. **Athanasios Petridis** for his work on high-energy nuclear physics and quantum mechanics as well as his mentorship of undergraduate researchers. Dr. Petridis will present a lecture at this esteemed event next October.


Dr. Ross also presented the Distinguished Engagement Award to Associate Professor of Art and Design **Neil Ward**, recognizing his artistry, service and leadership in his collaboration, mentorship and community engagement.

Associate Professor of Art and Design and board member of the Center for the Humanities, Emily Newman, recognized Associate Professor of English **Yasmina Madden** as the recipient of the 2025 Humanities Research Scholar Award. The research scholarship award will allow Professor Madden to write a novel continuing her exploration of the cultural composition of the female body, gender construction and expectations, female sexuality, and taboo behavior.

Congratulations to Professor of Biology and Director of Kinesiology **David Senchina**, who has been named the inaugural chairholder of the Cliff Rea Endowed Chair In Biology.

Dr. Senchina was selected based on his outstanding research record, excellence in teaching, and active involvement of undergraduate students in research. Students in his lab have co-authored 22 peer-reviewed publications since 2011, focusing on the somatosensory perception—the body's ability to sense touch, pressure, pain, and temperature—of athletic footwear.



Dr. David Skidmore of Drake's Department of Political Science just published a new book titled *China, the West, and the Global Development Financing Regime: Competitive Convergence* with Edward Elgar Publishing. The book examines how China and traditional Western-led financial institutions are reshaping the global development landscape—sometimes in competition, often in convergence, and always with implications for multilateralism and global order. 2025-2026 Faculty Development Grant Applications Open through November 10

The College of Arts & Sciences offers support for research, scholarly work, grant writing, pedagogical development, and creative endeavors (submit by November 10, 2025).

Collaborative Projects (up to \$2,500) These grants are available to two or more faculty who are working on a joint project: reading groups, conference planning, curriculum revision and development, and so on. Funds may be used to purchase materials and/or compensate student research assistants.

Teaching/Scholarship/Research Projects (up to \$2,000) These grants provide faculty with support for research, creative activity, writing projects, and pedagogical development. Grants may be used to purchase materials (books, software, permissions, supplies), support project-related travel (libraries, laboratories, archives, sites, etc.), and/or compensate student research assistants.

Professional Activities Small Grant (up to \$300) This easy-to-apply-for grant provides funds for faculty to purchase items related to professional activities (e.g., books, software, permissions, instrumentation fees, facility admission, teaching/research supplies, subscriptions, honorariums, publication charges).

Deputy Provost Jimmy Senteza announced the selection of three new Ellis and Nelle Levitt Distinguished Professors at Drake University in 2026. This prestigious honor recognizes exceptional faculty for their teaching excellence, scholarly contributions, consulting activities, leadership, and service to the university's mission.

Full professors are eligible to apply for the professorship. The awardees will receive an annual salary supplement of \$5,000.

Deans will forward recommendations to Deputy Provost **Jimmy Senteza** by March 13, 2026, who will convene a faculty committee to review nominations and make recommendations to the Provost, President, and Board of Trustees.

Between November 11 and December 15, 2025, Admissions will host ten [Virtual Academic Spotlights](#) across the University! Thank you for your collaboration and participation again this year. Last year a total of 252 students attended Virtual Academic Spotlights. Of this number, 185 were entering 2025 students of which 90 enrolled (48.65%) compared to the year prior that welcomed 292 entering 2024 student attendees, of which 100 enrolled (34.25%). These Spotlights are a unique and effective recruitment strategy, bringing together Admissions staff, our faculty and current students, and prospective families on Zoom.

The deadline to drop a course with a W was Sunday, Oct 26. If a student requests to drop a course at this point in the semester, that request should be directed to Associate Dean Adina Kilpatrick, adina.kilpatrick@drake.edu, and should be accompanied by evidence of an extenuating circumstance to justify the withdrawal.

NEW (AND NEW-ISH) FORM!

The [Registration Waiver Request](#) form, i.e., a request to waive a course pre-requisite was released last spring, but this fall sees the release of the [Credit Overload Request](#) form, another ProcessMaker form. This form is used by those students required to enroll in more than 18 credits due scholarship or ensemble requirements, CREW Scholar membership, ROTC involvement or participation as a tutor. Please encourage advisees who will need to raise their credit hours, to complete this form prior to their registration window. The completion of the credit overload request form will prompt our office to seek faculty advisor/mentor approval and help identify those students who can adjust schedules and avoid an overloaded semester. THE FORUM ON EDUCATION ABROAD

New Research Shows Study Abroad Boosts Career Skills

A recent report from the Forum on Education Abroad entitled **“The Talent Advantage: What Study Abroad Alumni Can Do Differently in the Workplace”** demonstrates that students who participate in study abroad cultivate key competencies that align closely with employer priorities. Specifically, the research finds that through micro-moments experienced abroad (e.g., navigating unfamiliar cultural contexts, adapting on-the-spot, and collaborating across difference) participants develop **adaptability, innovation mindsets, resilience, and strong interpersonal communication skills**.

These findings reinforce how global learning experiences not only enrich the undergraduate journey but also actively contribute to career readiness by strengthening the very skills that differentiate successful professionals. [Read the report here.](#)


