Leland Aldridge, Visiting Assistant Professor of Physics

Dr. Leland Aldridge joins us from Gonzaga and Minnesota State University Moorhead. He received his PhD from the University of Connecticut and completed a postdoctoral fellowship at Yale University. He specializes in the slowing and cooling of molecules using laser light and enjoys helping students connect theory and practice in their physics classes. Fun fact about Leland: Outside of physics, Leland enjoys constructing logic and crossword puzzles

Neal Endicott, Visiting Assistant Professor of Music Theory and Composition

Dr. Neal Endicott specializes in Music Theory and Composition. He holds a M.M. and a D.M.A. degree in composition and music theory from Michigan State University, as well as degrees in composition, business, and music performance from Western Michigan University. Before joining Drake, Neal served on the faculties of East Tennessee State University and Saginaw Valley State University. Neal's research blends creative composition and traditional scholarly work, focusing on the development of methodologies to diversify and modernize the undergraduate music theory curriculum. Fun Fact: Neal is a massive Francophile and enjoys discussing French music and cuisine.

Emilee Hart, Assistant Professor in ENSS, Zoo and Conservation Science

Dr. Emilee Hart specializes in Zoo and Conservation Science, focusing on behavioral endocrinology and hormonal monitoring techniques. She received her PhD in Biomedical Sciences – Human Evolutionary Biology from Kent State University. Before her time at Kent State, she worked at the Tulane National Primate Research Center in New Orleans, managing a primate breeding colony of over 5,000 monkeys and conducting health assessments. Emilee is excited to involve students in her research on reproductive health and wellness of animals in zoos. Emilee has nearly ten years of experience in theater and brings an engaging teaching style to her courses. Her dynamic approach has even led her fitness watch to classify her lectures as "aerobic exercise!"

Bryan Hummel, Visiting Assistant Director of Bands/Assistant Professor of Percussion

A proud Drake alum, Bryan Hummel returns to the Music Department to teach percussion and serve as Assistant Director of Bands. He graduated in 2014 with degrees in Percussion Performance and Music Education from Drake University and earned his Master of Music in Percussion Performance from Arizona State University. Bryan has a diverse teaching background. He has taught band and orchestra to elementary, middle, and high

school students, and served as instructor with athletic bands at Arizona State University. He is an active designer for the marching arts. Fun fact: Bryan and his fiancée, Nichole, are getting married next June!

Misha Winchester, Visiting Assistant Professor of Theatre Costume Design

Misha Winchester brings a wealth of experience in costume design and education. She got her MFA in Theatre Costume Design and Technology from the University of South Dakota. She has taught costume design at the University of North Dakota, the University of Nevada, Reno, and at Truman State University. Lu Zhang, Professor of Practice in Data Analytics, Qingdao/Drake University United College

Dr. Lu Zhang joins the College of Arts and Sciences as an inaugural faculty member in the Data Analytics program at Drake/Qingdao University United College. She received her Master's in Applied Statistics from Anhui University in China and completed her Ph.D. at Northern Illinois University. Lu's background is deeply rooted in statistics—both in applying it to help people solve problems and in teaching the next generation about its power and versatility. Her research focuses on training machine learning models with high-frequency financial data, essentially exploring how AI can mimic financial trading strategies with probabilities. Fun fact: Lu moved to Qingdao a couple of weeks ago with her cat!

Lan Zhou, Professor of Practice in Biology, Qingdao/Drake University United College

Dr. Lan Zhou joins the College of Arts and Sciences as an inaugural faculty member in the Data Analytics program at Drake/Qingdao University United College. She brings 20 years of experience as a Research Scientist at DuPont Pioneer, where she was the lead scientist that discovered a new gene for the next generation of insecticidal products in corn and soybean. Lan Zhou received her BS in Biochemistry from Peking University in Beijing, China, her MS in Biochemistry of Plant Virology from Inner Mongolia University, and her Ph.D. in Biochemistry from Iowa State University. Her teaching experience include teaching Biochemistry courses at DMACC. Fun fact: Lan and her husband own a Chinese restaurant called Jade Garden in Ankeny!

Dr. Ryan Sturms awarded grant from the National Science Foundation

Dr. Ryan Sturms, Assistant Professor of Chemistry, was recently awarded a \$166,000 grant from the National Science Foundation to study the hemoglobin proteins of mosses, liverworts, and hornworts. This competitive grant supports students in the Sturms lab as they examine the reactions and structures of these proteins and present their findings at national and international scientific meetings.

Additionally, the grant enables a partnership between Dr. Sturms and the Research Experience for Teachers (RET) program administered by Iowa State University. Through this collaboration, selected high school science teachers will come to Drake for summer research training in the Sturms Lab, coupled with professional development at Iowa State University. RET participants will take their research experiences and training back to their classrooms to encourage more students to enter the science fields following high school graduation.

Most recently, Dr. Sturms presented results collected by Sydney Dvorak (B.S. 2025) from the proof of concept for this grant at the 22nd International Conference on Oxygen Binding and Sensing Proteins hosted by the University of Essex.

Drake-Qingdao University United College Welcomes Its First Faculty Cohort



We are thrilled to announce the official launch of our faculty teaching in Qingdao! Just this week, College of Arts and Sciences professors have begun leading classes at the Drake-Qingdao University United College, marking an exciting new chapter in this global partnership.

Three of our colleagues have already arrived safely in Qingdao, settled into their new homes just two bus stops from campus, and met their Chinese colleagues and students in the Biology and Data Analytics programs.

With their expertise and enthusiasm, the Drake-Qingdao University United College is off to a fantastic start!

2025-2026 Faculty Development Grant Applications open through October 31

The College of Arts & Sciences offers support for research, scholarly work, grant writing, pedagogical development, and creative endeavors (submit by October 31, 2025).

Collaborative Projects (up to \$2,500) These grants are available to two or more faculty who are working on a joint project: reading groups, conference planning, curriculum revision and development, and so on. Funds may be used to purchase materials and/or compensate student research assistants.

Teaching/Scholarship/Research Projects (up to \$2,000) These grants provide faculty with support for research, creative activity, writing projects, and pedagogical development. Grants may be used to purchase materials (books, software, permissions, supplies), support project-related travel (libraries, laboratories, archives, sites, etc.), and/or compensate student research assistants.

Professional Activities Small Grant (up to \$300) This easy-to-apply-for grant provides funds for faculty to purchase items related to professional activities (e.g., books, software, permissions, instrumentation fees, facility admission, teaching/research supplies, subscriptions, honorariums, publication charges).

Admissions Corner

Thank you for offering faculty appointments for visiting high school juniors, seniors, and transfers. We promote the opportunity for students to have a faculty appointment during their campus visit and share they must request the appointment 2 weeks in advance.

Here is some data regarding effectiveness of last cycle's Individual Visits:

Between Sept – May, 837 students attended an individual visit of which 436 were entering seniors. Of these 436 seniors, 251 **did not** have a faculty visit and 179 students **did** have a faculty visit. (41% of the visitors had a faculty appointment)

- Of the 251 seniors who DID NOT have a faculty appointment during their visit, 199 applied (79.3%) and 86 enrolled (43.2%).
- Of the 179 seniors who DID have a faculty appointment, 139 applied (77.7%) and 67 enrolled (48.2%)
- In sum, the **seniors who had a faculty appointment enrolled at a 5% higher rate than those who did not.**

Amy Guiter, Campus Visit Coordinator, will continue to reach out to the respective college/school/department contacts as students request faculty appointments.

Fridays continue to be the most popular day for students/families to visit. As an added enhancement, **Fridays with Griff**, offer morning visitors the opportunity to attend a student panel (12 – 12:30 PM) and see Griff, as well as enjoy an Admission Overview, campus tour, lunch on campus and, if requested 2 weeks in advance, a faculty appointment. Fall Fridays with Griff dates are: **September 26, October 3, October 24, October 31, November 14, November 21, December 5.**

Student Support Corner

A Gentle Reminder, Meeting with Advisees

If you serve as a Faculty Mentor this semester, please send an email message as a mentor to welcome your entering first-year and/or transfer mentees, providing them with information about your office location and office hours, and inviting them for a meeting individually or as a cohort.

Send a similar message to continuing mentees, welcoming them back. Sent early in the semester, your messages will hopefully help cultivate a sense of belonging and aid in creating meaningful connections with your mentees for the rest of the academic year.

Early Alert

If you have any student concerns, please use Starfish to raise a flag. Early alerts help identify at-risk students and share that information with advisors and other student support staff on campus. Allowing for timely intervention, this has proven benefits for retention and graduation rates.

Graduation and Commencement Applications

It's imperative that faculty mentors urge students to check and verify their graduation date in the system. If the student is planning on graduating early, they must fill out a change of record form: **MyDrake** → **Student Records** → **Change of Record Request**. With the graduation application, students will not be prompted to, or be able to see, the graduation application until the semester before their recorded graduation date in Banner and then, only if their graduation date is accurately listed. Our office and the Registrar's Office have reached out to December 2025 graduates with information on applying for graduation.

As a reminder, there will be no December 2025 commencement ceremony, but all students graduating in December 2025 will be invited to attend the May 2026 commencement ceremony.


Please send the student's name to studentsupport.as@drake.edu. We will reach out to the student to finalize their enrollment. This is also important to make sure that the student is ok and safe.

Tutoring Services

[Tutoring services](#) are available for course-based support in the areas of actuarial science, accounting, biology, chemistry, computer science, economics, organic chemistry, physics, math, Spanish, and statistics. The resources of the Writing Center are also available to all students in any course. Students can sign up directly for tutoring associated with courses they are registered for via Starfish.

The Writing Center opens this week.

Students can schedule an appointment via Starfish. The Writing Center is directed by a faculty member and staffed by undergraduate students who are trained to tutor. Writing Center tutors are experienced writers and friendly critics who can help students with essays, reports, or research papers.



New Internal Advising Website!

The new website is a centralized resource for students, faculty, and staff on various advising-related topics. The site includes information regarding best practices in faculty and staff advising, resources for students and faculty mentors, and other helpful information. This is a work in progress, and the Office of Advising will continue to develop the site as the blended advising model is fully implemented and evolves. Students, Faculty Mentors, Assistant/Associate Deans, and Advising Specialists can access the website via **myDrake** → **Internal Sites** → **Academic Services** → **Advising & Mentoring** or directly using [this link](#) (note that you may need to log in with your Drake credentials to access the site through the link).

First-Generation Resource:

Did you know that **First-generation students** make up 20% of Drake's new student population? Drake defines a first-generation student as a college student whose parents/legal guardians have not received a bachelor's degree from a four-year university. In an effort to make more connections between first gen students and first gen

The College of Arts and Sciences mourns the loss of John Canarina, who died on August 25. Many of you will fondly remember John as the charismatic conductor and Director of Orchestra Studies at Drake for 35 years. In his long tenure at Drake, Maestro Canarina left an indelible mark on the Drake Symphony Orchestra with his vision and commitment to undergraduate education.

Professor Stratton was a beloved teacher and a passionate biomedical scientist. His commitment to education and science left a lasting impact on many generations of students. He was recognized for his excellence in teaching with the prestigious Arts and Sciences Teacher of the Year award.




