
The Stalnaker Lecture Award is presented to a distinguished faculty member who is invited to present a lecture to the university community on a topic in their discipline.

- 2) Personalize as much as possible.
- 3) Get creative with what "meetings" look like.
- 4) Make sure emails aren't too long and have immediate action items.
- 5) Think about the timing you send your emails.
