Andrew Becklin, Assistant **Professor of Mathematics**



Andrew earned his Ph.D. and MS from the University of Nebraska and his BA in Mathematics and Economics from Luther College. His graduate school work was predominantly in Applied Analysis and Partial Differential Equations, focusing on Acoustics Models. Since he started at Drake as a VAP, he has been building Agent Based Models to

analyze social issues. He loves using Inquiry Based Methods in his math courses, and getting students to discover math.

Robert Collis, Assistant Professor of History

Robert grew up in rural Suffolk, north-east of London, Britain. He got his undergraduate and MS from the University of Sussex in Brighton. He received his Ph.D. from the University of Turku in Finland. His research focuses on Western Esotericism in Eighteenth-Century Russia. He has taught couses on Russian and Soviet history. As a VAP at Drake for several years, he established his reputation as a highly popular and grifted teacher, covering classes from the Renaissance to the Cold War.

Andrei Migunov, Assistant **Professor of Computer Science**

Andrei is originally from Riga, Latvia. He recently received his Ph.D. in Computer Science from Iowa State University. His research is in the areas of Algorithmic Randomness and Analog Computation. He loves teaching to see scientific curiosity form in students, going beyond immediate practical utility.

Hyejin Park, Assistant Professor of Mathematics

Hyejin graduated from the University of Georgia witha Ph.D. in Mathematics Education. She worked at Marquette University as a Post-Doctoral Research Associate and as a VAP at James Madison University. Her research focuses on learning and teaching argumentation and proof in K-12 classrooms. Her current work explores how to support teacher learning about using robotics to promote student argumentation understanding and in mathematics classrooms. As a teacher educator and mathematics teacher, she has taught content and pedagogy courses for prospective teachers and mathematics courses for noneducation majors.

Elizabeth Talbert, Assistant **Professor of Sociology**

Elizabeth completed her Ph.D. in Sociology at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore and followed by a postdoctoral fellowship at the Center on Poverty and Inequality at Stanford. Prior to that, she did her undergraduate work at Yale, taught fourth grade in the Bronx for a few years, and did a MS in Public Policy at



the University of Michigan. Her research revolves around social policy, poverty, and inequality in the United States, with a particular emphasis on family and housing. Currently working with the unsheltered population in Des Moines to inform the country's Homeless Coordinating

Council and its Extreme Weather Workgroup. She tries to make her courses based in community-engaged research. She teaches courses on social welfare policy, poverty, and work.

Proactive Advising

It's hard to believe that in just one month, you'll start to be approached by advisees to discuss spring 2023 courses. To best work with those advisees who may have ended the spring semester on academic probation or who appealed a suspension, you will hear from Alina Grimm or Mary Beth Holtey, who will share with you a list of your advisees on academic probation or returning from suspension. Please work with these students to identify coursework which may be retaken, or to create strategies for better study skills.

Tutoring Services

Tutoring services are available for course-based support in the areas of actuarial science, accounting, biology, chemistry, computer science, economics, organic chemistry, physics, math, Spanish and statistics. The resources of the Writing Center and Speaking Center are also available to all students in any course.

The Writing Center (opens September 12)

Students can schedule an appointment at https://library.drake.edu/writing-center/.

The Writing Center is directed by a faculty member and staffed by undergraduate students who are trained to tutor. Writing Center tutors are experienced writers and friendly critics who can help students on essays, reports, or research papers.

The Speaking Center (opens September 12)

Students can schedule an appointment at http://library.drake.edu/speaking to schedule a personal online meeting with a tutor.

Speaking Center tutors have experience and training in speech pedagogy and are prepared to assist students when selecting and narrowing topics, organizing ideas, drafting, and revising an outline, preparing visual aids, and practicing delivery. The Speaking Center's staff also facilitates access to research and resources that can help speakers and presenters.

Process for Communicating Academic Accommodations:

1) When a student requests accommodations, they must provide documentation to Access & Success.

First-year students, students new to requesting accommodations, and transfer students are required to make an appointment with Access & Success. Access & Success work together with the student to determine reasonable accommodations for each of the student's classes. 3) An Accommodation Flag will be raised in Starfish

4) The instructor will receive an email stating the accommodations for the student. The student receives a similar email at the same time. As the email states, students are responsible for reviewing this information with instructors in a timely manner.

Returning students can fill out an accommodation request form, found on the Access & Success website, www.drake.edu/access-success. The same process will be followed as above, however returning students do not need to meet with Access & Success unless their accommodations need to be changed.

Visit Starfish Resources for Faculty and Staff to find out how to filter your accommodated students for each of your classes - we have heard from faculty teaching large classes that this is a very helpful feature!
