#### **Admission Criteria**

Drake University's OTD program operates on a rolling admission process. We will interview and admit students until the O1 class is full and a sufficient number of applicants have been identified for the waitlist. We recommend submitting application materials early to ensure your application is processed and considered in a timely manner.

To be considered for admission, applicants must

- Submit an OTCAS application

- Submit the required Drake application fee of \$70 via the Drake OTD website:

- Complete at least 3 years of undergraduate coursework (approximately 92 semester credit hours)
- Earn a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher (as calculated in OTCAS)

# **Prerequisites Requirements**

Applicants must earn a grade of C or higher to fulfill prerequisite courses. Applicants who wish to fulfill prerequisites through Advanced Placement or other testing options should contact the College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences at <a href="mailto:drake.edu">drake.edu</a>. - General Psychology (3 semester credit hours)
- Developmental Psychology (3 semester credit hours)
- Abnormal Psychology (3 semester credit hours)
- Social Sciences Elective (3 semester credit hours)
- Statistics (3 semester credit hours)
- Medical Terminology (1 semester credit hour)
- English Composition/Writing (6 semester credit hours)
- Public Speaking (3 semester credit hours)
- General Electives (59 semester credit hours)

The entry-level occupational therapy doctoral degree program is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education (ACOTE) of the American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA), located at 6116 Executive Boulevard, Suite 200, North Bethesda, MD 20852-4929. ACOTE's telephone number c/o AOTA is (301) 652-AOTA and its Web address is <u>www.acoteonline.org</u>. Graduates of the program will be eligible to sit for the national certification examination for the occupational therapist administered by the National Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy (NBCOT). After successful completion of this exam, the individual will be an Occupational Therapist, Registered (OTR). In addition, all states require licensure in order to practice; however, state licenses are usually based on the results of the NBCOT Certification Examination. Note that a felony conviction may affect a graduate's ability to sit for the NBCOT certification examination or attain state licensure. Students must complete Level II fieldwork and experiential requirements within 24 months following completion of the didactic portion of the program.
