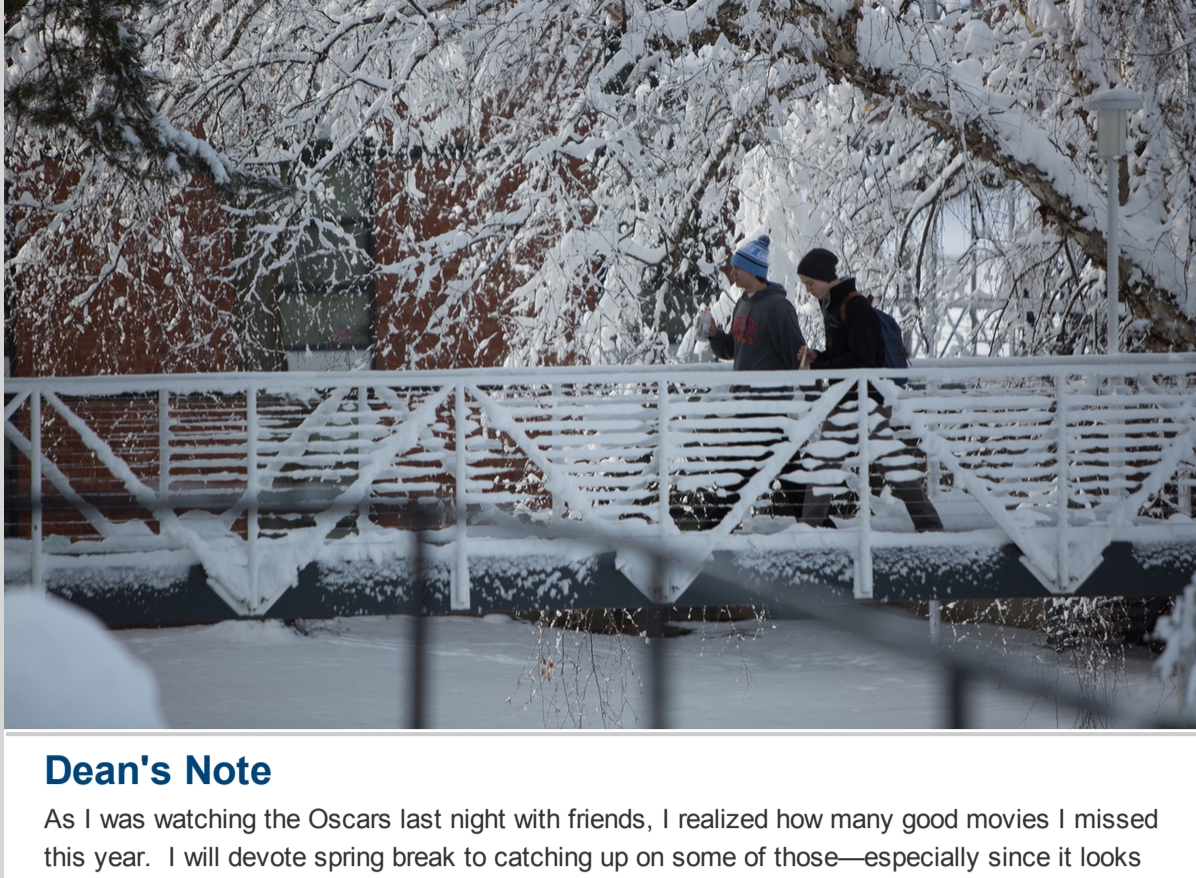

Call for Nominations for E.A. Sheslow Prize

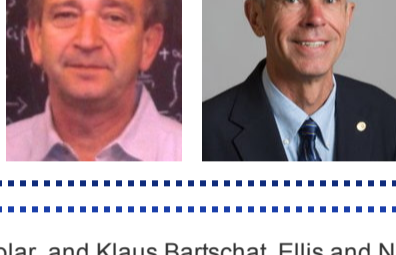
The Sheslow Prize recognizes the achievements of students in the College of Arts and Sciences who:

- are in their junior year, (graduating the following fall or spring semester—students graduating this May are not eligible);
- are working toward a B.S., B.F.A., B.M., B.M.E. or B.A. degree to be awarded by the College of Arts and Sciences;
- have demonstrated leadership;
- have a record of performance in student life activities or on- and off-campus employment.

Eligible nominees will be invited to submit a resume, an essay on leadership, and three supporting letters of recommendation. Awards will be based upon the committee's evaluation of these materials. One prize of \$1,500 will be awarded. The award is presented at the College of Arts and Sciences Honors Convocation ceremony during the spring semester.

TO NOMINATE: Nominations should be submitted to ask.as@drake.edu by March 4th. Nominated students will be notified and invited to forward required supporting materials. The deadline has been extended from February 15 due to no current nominations.

Spotlights



Oleg Zatsarinny, research scholar, and Klaus Bartschat, Ellis and Nelle Levitt Distinguished professor of physics, recently received a National Science Foundation grant for their research "Elements: NSCI-Software -- A General and Effective B-Spline R-Matrix Package for Charged-Particle and Photon Collisions with Atoms, Ions, and Molecules." The project deals with the further development and subsequent distribution of a suite of computer codes that can accurately describe the interaction of charged particles (mostly electrons) and light (mostly lasers and synchrotrons) with atoms and ions. The grant awarded is for \$476,000.



Tim Knepper, Director of The Comparison Project and professor of philosophy, was awarded \$93,000 from the Arthur Vining Davis Foundations in support of TCP's interfaith youth-leadership camp, which they hold annually with the Des Moines Area Religious Council. The award empowers The Comparison Project to convene an interfaith leadership institute for Drake students, as well as to host a mini-conference at Drake for academic/non-profit teams from across the nation.

Rachel Fritz, junior political science and psychology double major, was awarded the Henry Clay Center for Statesmanship Scholarship to study public policy in Kentucky and Washington D.C. this summer (2019). The two week College Student Congress will allow participating students the opportunity to learn about the principles of statesmanship in the tradition of one of Kentucky's greatest statesmen, Henry Clay. Throughout the week, students will have the opportunity to speak with academics, lawmakers, journalists and civic leaders to discuss the practical importance of compromise and partisan cooperation to resolve conflict and develop policy solutions for today's most pressing issues.

Haley Barbour, POLS, AS '17, has been appointed Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand's Iowa Political Director.

Deborah Kent (Assoc. Prof. of Math) gathered a group of current and former Drake faculty and two alumni last week to compete in a STEM trivia fundraiser for the Science Center of Iowa. They are now the champions of the "Battle of the Brains"! As the group gathered their swag, a Drake alumnae who works at the Science Center commented "Well of course the professors won." Two other Drake faculty volunteered as "hired brains" who were available to trivia participants in exchange for a donation.



"Stand Up Science," a local comedy show held at the Des Moines Social Club and hosted by a comedian Shane Mauss featured Will Garriott as one of the (social) scientists featured. He gave a presentation about his research on drug laws—especially focused on marijuana. It was educational and entertaining and it was a packed house full of pro-science, mostly younger people.
