· Per new sabbatical guidelines, a faculty member is allowed one sabbatical per 7 years.

100% pay for one semester sabbaticals, 70% pay for academic year sabbaticals, and 85%

Sabbatical Reports are due by September 15 in the academic year following the sabbatical. This will be a Qualtrics form provided by the Provost's Office.

Nominations Due September 1st

for each fiscal year on calendar year sabbaticals.

- Please nominate a colleague for one of the three college awards. Nominations for the Stalnaker Lecturer, Centennial Scholar, and Distinguished Engagement Award are due
- outstanding contributions of Drake faculty and staff to the college community. The nominee must be a current faculty or staff member with at least five years of service at Drake. The recipient will be announced at the annual Stalnaker Lecture.



Dale had a BA and MA in Religion from Phillips University (1944, 1945); a BD in Theology from Vanderbilt (1949); and a PhD in Church History from University of Chicago (1955). He taught religion at Drake University from 1954 until 1993 before earning emeritus status. He is survived by his wife of 72 years, Betty, their 6 children, and many grandchildren. Dale was a professor, minister, and political activist. He lived a life of generous service and love.
