New Course Proposals or Course Changes

a course with a W. When you discuss the possibility of withdrawing from a course with a W with your advisee, please bring up the following considerations: Financial: A student registered for 12 credit hours withdrawing from a course, is still attempting 12 credit hours, so remains a full-time student, registered and billed for 12 credit hours. Dropping with a W does not take a full-time student to part-

term and the GPA calculated based on the grades earned in courses for which the student remained enrolled. Withdrawing from too many courses can impact ability to qualify for financial aid. For more on satisfactory academic process, see here. Academic: A student who withdraws from a course does not earn credit for the

new grade and the W will appear on the transcript.

Athletic: Withdrawing from a course may have implications for the student's athletic eligibility. Per NCAA standards, at certain points in his/her academic career a student athlete needs to have 40, 60 and 80% of his/her degree completed. Please encourage your student athlete advisee to consult with the Athletics before withdrawing from a course. After October 28th, students may only withdraw from a class due to extenuating

Deadline for New Courses/Course Changes for Spring 2020

Any permanent changes to courses, including new courses (not offered under a Special Topics course) should be submitted using the two forms on the A&S Form page. New courses and course changes for Spring 2020 should be submitted prior to October 1st to allow for approval by Curriculum Committee and A&S Council before registration begins. Once registration begins, changes courses can cause complications with a student's schedule

(even causing a course to have to be removed from their schedule).


