
A&S Newsletter September 9, 2019

Deadline for New Courses/Course Changes for Spring 2020



approval by Curriculum Committee and A&S Council before registration begins. Once registration begins, changes courses can cause complications with a student's schedule (even causing a course to have to be removed from their schedule).
